A personalised approached for a balanced education

For over 120 years, teaching and learning has been at the core of what we do at Trinity Grammar School, Kew.

Predicated by the Australian Curriculum and underscored by a philosophy of student agency, growth and resilience, our approach provides the opportunities and challenges, as well as the structure and support, to give our young people a balanced education.

The Trinity classroom is a defined single-sex learning environment for boys from Prep-Year 10, with the opportunity to experience coeducation in VCE in partnership with Ruyton Girls' School. Our Early Learning Centre accommodates both boys and girls at the 3 and 4-year-old level.

At every age and stage, personalised learning and wellbeing is a priority. Our teaching staff work in partnership with students, parents, support staff and leadership to walk with them on their educational journey.

On the path from early childhood learning to high school graduation, we strive to see our students and graduates become the best version of themselves, whatever that may be.

International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme

At Trinity, we teach using the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme approach from ELC – Year 6.

Subjects are taught through a transdisciplinary approach model, whilst fulfilling the requirements of the Australian Curriculum.

The IB PYP provides the framework for exploration and study in the Junior School using six transdisciplinary themes:

- How we express ourselves
- How the world works
- How we organise ourselves
- Sharing the planet

Cocurricular Opportunities

Junior School students have access to Trinity's high-quality cocurricular programs, supported by specialist staff who cater programs to every age and stage.

Outdoor programs, including excursions and camps, build confidence and resilience, and establish an appreciation for the land on which we learn every day.

All Junior School students are taught technical and survival skills in Trinity's onsite pool by specialist swimming coaches during Terms 1 and 4.

Camp program

The suite of camp experiences in the Junior School are tailored to suit each age and stage.

The combination of fun and challenging activities is intended to foster and build confidence, independence, leadership, communication and teamwork.

Camp experiences such as these also provide opportunities for learning links to IB transdisciplinary themes such as 'How exploration changed Australia' and 'Where we are in place and time'.

The extensive camp and outdoor education program continues throughout the Senior School.

Swimming

In Term 1 and Term 4 each year, Trinity students from Prep – Year 6 are taught technical and survival skills in the pool by specialist swimming coaches.

Clubs and Extension Opportunities




Junior School Houses
